Attendance: Change to penalty notices

New Government guidelines, which came into effect on 19th August 2024, prevent schools from granting any leave of absence during term time, **unless there are exceptional circumstances**.

A family holiday during term time <u>does not</u> fall under the category of 'exceptional circumstances' and therefore the school is unable to grant leave of absence for your family holiday request.

As a result, any absence that your child has during this period will be recorded on our registers as unauthorised. Furthermore, it is now the responsibility of the Academy under the law to inform Leicestershire County Council of this matter who may issue a Penalty Notice in line with this Government policy. If this is the case, you will receive a letter from the County Council outlining the details of the penalty.

A summary of the new national framework for penalty notices is below:

Numeracy Update

Tutor time numeracy

Numeracy is important because it helps individuals develop the essential skills needed to understand and work with numbers. It is a crucial skill that is used in everyday tasks such as managing finances, interpreting data and making informed decisions. Including numeracy as part of the tutor time program helps students build a strong foundation in mathematics, improve problem-solving abilities and enhance critical thinking skills. This, in turn, prepares them for future academic and professional success.

In our program we use a mixture of Numeracy Ninjas, deliberate skill based practice and problem solving to help strengthen students numeracy skills and build confidence.

Confidence plays a crucial role in learning as it empowers individuals to take on challenges, embrace new concepts and persist in the face of difficulties. When learners have confidence in



their abilities, they are more likely to participate actively in class, ask questions and seek clarification when needed. Starting their day in this positive way sets students up for a successful day of learning.

Numeracy Ninjas is a 5 minute task where students answer 30 questions. The amount they get correct relates to colour ninjas belt they have. Has your child reached Black belt yet?

Sparx Maths

Maths homework is set every Tuesday and is due in the following Tuesday for all students in years 7 to 11. In maths we use the online platform Sparx Maths.

Sparx Maths Homework is an online learning platform that creates personalised maths homework for students.

We believe that practice makes perfect, so each week, your child's teacher selects the topics that have been taught in class and Sparx builds a personalised set of questions to match your child's current level of understanding.

Our aim is for all children to strive for **100% completion** of their homework.

By consistently using Sparx Maths, your child can build a solid foundation in maths and achieve their full potential.

How does Sparx Maths make sure difficulty levels are correct?

The aim is to provide personalised, challenging and attainable homework that every child can complete each week.

Sparx constantly monitor homework and listen to teachers, so we can match your child's understanding. Each question also has a short video tutorial to help your child if they are stuck.

By progressing through each homework on their own, with the support from you and their teacher when needed, your child will have the best opportunity to answer 100% of the questions correctly.

How can I help my child with their Sparx Maths Homework?





Year 7 art students have been looking at the formal elements and currently focussing on tone. There were some excellent mark making and shading techniques being used:







Year 9 this year are experiencing shorter more intense rotations to enable them to experience all the subjects we have to offer before making their GCSE option choices.

Year 9 graphics students have been going back to basics and learning how to draw in perspective.





This year we will focus on how parents and carers can support their child with the decision they make throughout the year linked to careers. This will include:

- Choosing GCSE subjects
- Post 16 pathways
- Post 18 pathways

We also make sure that parents and carers know about any career events that are taking place at the Academy and College in advance. This will enable you to discuss the event and how young people can make the most of the opportunities they are offered.

Careers Interviews

Students are offered careers interviews several times throughout their school and college life. Below is more information about what a careers interview is and how you, as parents and carers, can support your son and daughter to make the most of their meetings.


What is a careers meeting/interview?

It is a one-on-one meeting in school where the students meet with a careers advisor. They will provide insights into Further Education and Higher Education opportunities, voluntary work, Technical and Apprenticeship support, employment opportunities, detailed careers-based advice and guide young people with their specialist knowledge. During the meeting, their interpersonal (traits and attributes) and communication skills and qualifications are discussed.

These meetings provide benefits, including exchanging ideas, learning about job opportunities, gaining career advice, building confidence, and getting answers to your career-related questions. Whether your child seeking guidance or exploring new paths, a careers meeting can be valuable for their growth.

What will be discussed and how will it help my child?

- How the Careers Team can support your child's career journey during their time at Wigston Academy and Wigston College
- To understand their strengths, motivations, interests and values
- To understand their learning styles, work-related skills, knowledge and abilities
- Together we will explore their future options and make decisions
- Together we will explore options to gain experience and confidence in decision making
- Help them to reflect on their own skills and experience
- Help them to understand the labour market and feel equipped to research relevant options
- To help them identify suitable resources and support relating to their needs and circumstances
- Support them in researching career options and work or further study opportunities



How does my child make the best of the appointment?

- Think of questions to ask
 - How long will it take me to become, for example, an IT coder?
 - What qualifications are best if I want to become......
 - Do I need to complete an apprenticeship for that role or would it be better for me to do a course?
- I have low predicted grades, does that mean I'm restricted in what I can achieve?
- Does studying A Levels always mean I have to do a degree?
- Do I have to do A Levels or can I do something else?
- Is university right for my career choices or their other routes that can help me achieve this?
- Can a degree apprenticeship help me more than the degree route, what is the difference?
- Complete the online careers programme Xello to bring ideas to the meeting
 - Link is on the intranet and time in PSHCE and Life skills is used to help the student get started
- What does your child want to find out during their appointment?
- What is important to them? Money, qualifications, a particularly pathway to their career?
 - What are the drivers to their chosen career choice?
- Being self-aware of their hobbies, interest, subjects and how they are taught
- Be prepared to be asked questions
- Be really honest and open during the appointment so we can help
- Be open-minded about different routes into their chosen career

How will my child remember everything that was talked about?

They will be given an action plan of all the information discussed in the meeting. They will receive one every time they attend a meeting with a careers advisor. There will be actions to complete. You can help your son or daughter by asking them about the interview and what they need to do.

Year 11 - Army visit – Wednesday 18th September 2024

The evening included a presentation from Mrs Dobney our Academic Mentor on our aforementioned Best Learner strategies and study techniques. Mrs Dobney was well supported by some very accomplished and insightful presentations from our Year 13 Students Alice Bettinson and Benjamin Spurling who covered topics such as the importance of time management and organisation. A big thank you to all involved.

We kick-started Black History Month with a Year 12 and 13 theatre trip to see The Mountaintop at Curve Leicester. The review below is from Serene Atkins of Year 13:

"The only way I could start this is by saying WOW. The Mountaintop was an experience that not only highlighted the presence of racial issues in society today but shed light on the roots of black injustice. The dynamic between Ray Strasser-King and Justina Kehinde (the actors that play Dr Martin Luther King and Camae) was truly beautiful to watch. Together they created a world where you could rationalise your thoughts and more importantly the thoughts of Dr Martin Luther King in his final hours.



It was so interesting to learn on a deeper level what Dr King may have been thinking the night he readied himself to fight for the Memphis sanitation workers. Putting the character of Camae into this was so impactful, as it added the humanising qualities to Dr King that I perceived to be necessary to the plays message. To me, it was about making a space where Dr King was to be seen as a normal human being above all else, with normal human struggles. Having him come face to face with death meant he was feeling the innate emotion of fear that everyone can relate to, immersing us into his story. Martin Luther King was an incredible man that has a legacy that will continue forever, and The Mountaintop allows us to see that society is forever changing, and the "baton" of black individuals facing injustice is forever being passed on, as we take inspiration from our predecessors to fight for our place and our worth."

Continuing in this vein, we have had the first of many meetings held by our student on the Culture and Diversity Committee as they begin to plan ways in which we can recognise and celebrate the richness and wealth of different backgrounds and heritage here at the College. The main topic of discussion is what they would like to plan for our Culture Day in November. It was a fabulous meeting full of great ideas and energy and was chaired by our Student Leaders Naomi Thompson (Head of Committee, Freya Mistry Assistant Head of Committee and Serene Atkins as Student Vice President).



ALUMNI UPDATES CLASS OF 2021


